The Catalyst Lab was recently transformed into a booming business! Ms. Uncapher asked 7th and 8th graders to be innovators and entrepreneurs with the "Hawkins Pencil Shop". Students marketed, produced, sold, and distributed personalized pencils to the staff and students. Her students were active participants in running their own business, interviewing for positions in marketing,

production, financial planning, sales, and distribution. This project

engaged students in math concepts of graphing systems of equations, percentages, fixed and variable quantities, revenue and determining profits. Business meetings were held to share progress, discuss data collected, and address difficulties and achievements.

Classroom News:

- Mrs. Brady's and Mrs. Thompson's 4th grade classes with Librarian Mr. Loge, conducted littleBits STEMM lessons. LittleBits are easy-to-use, color-coded, magnetic, electronic snap-and-lock circuits that can be linked together to teach basic circuitry and electromagnetism in a way that is interactive and fun. - Mr. Bryant's 2nd graders have been learning to apply properties of force and motion to solve tasks on a crash course. They've discovered that more weight and speed adds more force, which causes a bigger crash to happen. They are using these concepts to design pinball games for our enjoyment while recess is indoors over the winter months. (Photos below).





From Nurse Ashley

 Please do not send your student to school if they have ANY of the following: new cough, fever, runny nose, congestion, headache, sore throat, vomiting, nausea, diarrhea, muscle aches, fatigue, or loss of taste or smell. Please call the school for guidance on when your student can return.



- Current Isolation/Quarantine Policy
 - If a student has covid symptoms or tests positive for covid, they must isolate at home for 5 days from onset/ test. May return on day #6 as long as SIGNIFICANT improvement of symptoms and fever/vomiting/diarrhea have stopped for the previous 24 hours without the use of medication
 - If a student is exposed to a positive covid case in school setting they may continue to attend school as long as a mask is worn and have no covid symptoms. If symptoms develop then must isolate and get tested
 - If a student is exposed to a positive covid case outside of school setting they must quarantine at home for 5 days from last contact with a positive case. If symptoms develop, student must isolate and get tested. If a student is fully vaccinated and boosted if eligible or has tested positive for covid themselves in the previous 90 days, they do not have to quarantine unless they develop symptoms.
 - If a student is exposed to a positive case that they live with they must quarantine at home for 15 days from the positive cases symptom onset/test date. If a student is fully vaccinated and boosted if eligible or has tested positive for covid in the previous 90 days, they do not have to quarantine unless they develop symptoms.
- Rapid and PCR covid testing is available at the Rams Health Center at Rogers High School. An appointment is needed, call 419-442-7702 to schedule.
- Attention current 6th grade parents: Students in 7th grade are required to have 2 immunizations, Tdap and Meningococcal. If your student has already received these immunizations please turn in an updated immunization record.

From our Instructional Coach, Mrs. Madanski

Hawkins STEMM Academy is proud of our partnerships with the community. When teachers are planning PBL units for students to engage in, we consider how students can make their work public by explaining, displaying, and/or presenting it to people beyond the classroom. Recently, 7th grade students were judged in the OSLN Design Challenge. Teams presented their work on the PBL "A Playground for ALL" to leaders from SSOE, Ryan Wichman from WTOL and WCplays.org, and district level leaders. Jack Hunter, principal of ANSAT visited the winning team to give them their prize of a plane ride on TPS Airways!

Students in 7 different classrooms are working on a PBL unit titled "What's Growing On?", and worked with teachers and high school students at NSTC. Students were given work space to plant some of the pothos and spider plants they have propagated into soil, and learned how the automatic watering system works.



First grade students are working through a PBL titled "Communities". Dr. Czajkowski, a professor from the University of Toledo in the Geography and Planning department visited to discuss the importance of maps. Students worked through an activity with him to map out their journey to get to school.

These are just some examples of the collaborative experiences our students have within our STEMM learning community. Community partners are a key aspect of the structure of a PBL unit, and they provide students an authentic audience and purpose for working through the unit. We love our community partners!

Dress Code

• We have adopted the following dress code for all students who attend Hawkins STEMM Academy. It is expected that all students will comply with the dress code, beginning with the first day of school. Parents and students are equally responsible for the appearance of the student.

ITEM	DESCRIPTION OF ALLOWABLE ITEMS
TOPS	Any color or pattern; No graphics or text.
Collars at all times with the excep- tion of spirit wear.	Blouses, dress shirts, polo shirts, and button down shirts with a collar as well as turtle- necks, sweaters/cardigans (no hoods), TPS/HAWKINS spirit wear t-shirts or sweatshirts (crew neck only, no hoodies).
	Collars must be worn at all times with the exception of spirit wear.
BOTTOMS Must be worn at the waist.	Solid colors are encouraged but not limited to blue/navy, khaki/tan, black, brown, or gray; No graphics or text. Skirts, jumpers, dress or casual pants, slacks, corduroy pants, shorts, capris, and skorts. All items must be just above knee length or longer. No jeans, jeggings, leggings, yoga pants or sweat suits permitted.
SWEATER/JACKETS No hoods/hoodies.	Any color or pattern; No graphics or text. Cardigans, pullovers, jackets or vest in any color fleece or fabric. Light weights jackets only. No hoods permitted on items. Collars must be worn at all times with the exception of spirit wear.
SHOES/BOOTS/TENNIS SHOES	Any color or pattern; No graphics or text Shoes/Boots/Tennis Shoes with enclosed heels and toes. No platforms, slippers, slides, or Crocs.
*Students who do not comply with the dress code are subject to progressive disciplinary action.	

*School Administration reserves the right to make the final determination if clothes are appropriate.

Important Building Procedures

- Security We are continuing a security and contact tracing requirement that EVERY person who enters the building must provide their state ID in the main office. The ID will be scanned by the RAPTOR Visitor Management System. This system screens and tracks everyone coming in and out of TPS buildings. Accurate and reliable visitor details and sign-in history are recorded for every visitor that enters our schools which includes COVID questioning for tracing purposes if needed. The system checks visitors against a custom database set by TPS, which may contain custody alerts and/or banned visitors.
- Early Pickup The end of the school day at Hawkins tends to be very busy. If your child needs to be released early, please do so before 2:45 p.m. No exceptions!
- Dismissal Please follow all staff directions at dismissal. Just a reminder, we need to leave space for the busses to park and to follow the appropriate traffic patterns at dismissal. Students K-3 are dismissed at 3:10 p.m. and grades 4-6 at 3:15 p.m. Due to state requirements, 7 & 8th grade students are not released until 3:30 p.m. Please be on time to pick up your student(s) as there is no child care for students after 3:30 p.m.
