## Pull Tab Recycling!

Save those pull tabs from your aluminum cans. Drop off your collections WITH YOUR TEACHER! We'll recycle them and use the funds to stock the kitchen pantry for our guests. Each year, over 750 families stay at the Ronald McDonald House while their children receive medical care in Toledo. Thanks to our friends in Northwest Ohio and Southeast Michigan, RMHC collects pull tabs from schools, churches, libraries, factories, hospitals, service organizations, and local communities! With the money earned by recycling the tabs, we're able to offset over half of our annual food budget.

Tabs from cat and dog food cans, food cans and beverage containers are all recyclable aluminum for the House. Thanks to our local OmniSource recycling facility we pay nothing to recycle the tabs. They provide the container and pickup and return it to us for free when it's full!

Why do we recycle only the tab instead of the whole can? The tab of an aluminum can is pure aluminum unlike the rest of the can, which contains paint and other residue. Tabs are convenient to store and to transport, they take up less space than cans do, and they aren't as messy

### From Nurse Ashley

Immunizations: October 1, 2022 is the exclusion deadline for immunizations. If your student is not up to date on their immunizations before that date they will not be permitted to return to school until they are up to date. Letters and phone calls will be sent if your student is not up to date.



Illness: Please help us limit the spread of germs throughout the school by keeping your student home if they have cold symptoms. CDC recommends that people who test positive for Covid-19 or who have been exposed to Covid-19 and then develop cold symptoms remain at home for five days from the start of symptoms. If there is no known exposure to Covid-19 and your student has cold symptoms, they must remain at home until fever free for 24 hours without the use of medicine and until they are feeling better. If your student will be staying home ill, please call the office so their attendance may be excused.

Symptom	When to keep your child home from school	
Cough	A child with a deep or uncontrollable cough should be kept home even if they do not have a fever. Cough drops are not permitted in the school and your child will not be allowed to use them.	
Diarrhea and/or vomiting	A child experiencing diarrhea or vomiting needs to be kept home. Children need to be symptom free from diarrhea or vomiting for 24 hours without the use of medication before returning to school.	
Earache	Consult your medical provider for earaches especially if they are frequent. A child with an ear ache should stay home until pain free.	
Fever	Any child with a temperature over 100° F should stay home. Children can return to school once they are fever free for 24 hours without the use of medication. Please do not give your child fever reducing medication and then send them to school.	
Headache	A child whose only complaint is a mild headache will be okay to attend school. A child with frequent or a severe headache (Especially if also having neck stiffness) should be evaluated by your medical provider. A vision exam may also be necessary. A child with a significant headache should be kept home until pain free.	
Head Lice	Please contact the school nurse if your child has head lice. A child will be able to return to school once no live lice are pre- sent and the school nurse clears them.	
Pink Eye (Conjunctivitis)	A child with a pink/red eye and complaint of feeling irritated (Burning, itching, painful) or has matted eye lashes needs to be kept home and seen by a medical provider. Written permission from the medical provider will be necessary to return to school. Depending on the diagnosis, the child may have to stay home for 24 hours after antibiotic treatment begins.	
Rash/Skin Infections	A child with a new onset of rash or skin infection should be kept home until seen by a medical provider and the medical provider gives written permission for the child to return to school. Rashes/skin infections can cover the entire body or just one area. Rashes/skin infections include: Chicken Pox, Fifth Disease, Hand Foot and Mouth Disease, Herpes, Impetigo, Measles, MRSA, Ringworm (Scalp or skin), Rubella, or Scabies.	
Sore Throat/Strep Throat	A child with a severe sore throat that may or may not have white spots on the back of their throat should be kept home even if they do not have a fever. If your child is diagnosed with Strep Throat they can return to school 24 hours after starting an antibiotic.	
Stomachache	Consult your medical provider on stomach pain that is persistent or severe or if it limits your child's activity. If your child has vomiting or diarrhea associated with the pain, keep them home for 24 hours after the last episode of vomiting or diar- rhea without the use of medicine.	
Toothache	A child with a significant toothache needs to see a dentist and should be kept home until feeling better.	
Frequent Symptoms	Sometimes a child might pretend or exaggerate an illness in order to stay home. A child with frequent complaints of stom- achaches, headaches, or other symptoms may be showing signs that they are emotionally stressed. Please consult with your medical provider to have your child's symptoms evaluated. Stress-based complaints may cause a child to unnecessari- ly miss a great deal of school. It is important to frequently check with your child to see how they are doing emotionally and to keep school staff updated with any concerns you may have.	

## T.A.C.K.L.E., A School-Based Services Program

The T.A.C.K.L.E. program will return to Hawkins this school year. The goal of the program is to "build collaborative relationships with schools and community resources to address the mental health and school success of children and adolescents." ## **Dress Code**

• We have adopted the following dress code for all students who attend Hawkins STEMM Academy. It is expected that all students will comply with the dress code, beginning with the first day of school. Parents and students are equally responsible for the appearance of the student.

ITEM	DESCRIPTION OF ALLOWABLE ITEMS
TOPS	Any color or pattern; No graphics or text.
Collars at all times with the excep- tion of spirit wear.	Blouses, dress shirts, polo shirts, and button down shirts with a collar as well as turtle- necks, sweaters/cardigans (no hoods), TPS/HAWKINS spirit wear t-shirts or sweatshirts (crew neck only, no hoodies).
	Collars must be worn at all times with the exception of spirit wear.
<b>BOTTOMS</b> Must be worn at the waist.	Solid colors are encouraged but not limited to blue/navy, khaki/tan, black, brown, or gray; No graphics or text. Skirts, jumpers, dress or casual pants, slacks, corduroy pants, shorts, capris, and skorts. All items must be just above knee length or longer. No jeans, jeggings, leggings, yoga pants or sweat suits permitted.
SWEATER/JACKETS No hoods/hoodies.	Any color or pattern; No graphics or text. Cardigans, pullovers, jackets or vest in any color fleece or fabric. Light weights jackets only. No hoods permitted on items. Collars must be worn at all times with the exception of spirit wear.
SHOES/BOOTS/TENNIS SHOES	Any color or pattern; No graphics or text Shoes/Boots/Tennis Shoes with enclosed heels and toes. No platforms, slippers, slides, or Crocs.

\*School Administration reserves the right to make the final determination if clothes are appropriate.

### **Important Building Procedures**

- Security We are continuing a security and contact tracing requirement that EVERY person who enters the building must provide their state ID in the main office. The ID will be scanned by the RAPTOR Visitor Management System. This system screens and tracks everyone coming in and out of TPS buildings. Accurate and reliable visitor details and sign-in history are recorded for every visitor that enters our schools which includes COVID questioning for tracing purposes if needed. The system checks visitors against a custom database set by TPS, which may contain custody alerts and/or banned visitors.
- Early Pickup The end of the school day at Hawkins tends to be very busy. If your child needs to be released early, please do so before 2:45 p.m. No exceptions!
- Dismissal Please follow all staff directions at dismissal. Just a reminder, we need to leave space for the busses to park and to follow the appropriate traffic patterns at dismissal. Students K-3 are dismissed at 3:10 p.m. and grades 4-6 at 3:15 p.m. Due to state requirements, 7 & 8th grade students are not released until 3:30 p.m. Please be on time to pick up your student(s) as there is no child care for students after 3:30 p.m.
